

A spotlight on antitrust and competition law Market shifts in Latin America and Iberia 2022/23



Argentina



Secretary of Commerce has clarified the rules around merger approval for transactions involving a "change of control".

- Decision of Court of Appeals for Federal Civil and Commercial Matters sets out important precedents in the area of distribution and vertical restraints (April 2023).
- New regulations on M&A controls approved (May 2023).

Brazil



In 2022, **660 mergers were reviewed**. This is a record number.

- The Brazilian Competition Authority set up a specialized unit focusing on Unilateral Conduct to intensify
 the fight against abusive conducts (May 2022). Recent investigations show digital platforms
 and Bigtech are in the spotlight.
- Introduction of Law 14,470/2022, seeking to encourage actions to repair competitive damages (November 2022).
- Vertical merger review guidelines are expected in 2023.
- Severe change at the Competition Authority is expected as four out of seven commissioners will see their terms come to an end in 2023.

Chile



Significant development: interlocking directorates as a sanctionable conduct.

- In 2022, new guidance published on the analysis of horizontal mergers.
- The Authority has invested time in **market studies**, such as in hospitality and the impact of digital platforms.
- New Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Law that mandates prior competitive assessment from the Competition Tribunal.

Colombia



In 2022, 256 mergers were reviewed.

- The authority is showing a **proactive approach to bid rigging cases**.
- Asides from bid rigging investigations, the authority is accepting commitments to expedite the closure of investigations.

Mexico



Those involved in cartels could be sanctioned **with fines of up to 10% of income**. Individuals may also be punished with **imprisonment for up to 10 years**.

- The Federal Competition Commission (COFECE) announced it had **opened an investigation into possible cartels** in the distribution and exhibition of films in movie theaters and also the distribution and commercialization of scopolamine (May 2023).
- COFECE fined three water, waste management and treatment companies **more than MXN USD11 million** for failing to notify a transaction when legally required to do so (May 2023).

Peru



Indecopi has prioritized **cartel-related infringements** in the behavioral space, resulting in a significant decision in November 2021, currently in second administrative instance, **imposing fines of approximately USD697 million** on thirty construction companies and twenty-six individuals for rigging state construction projects.

- New merger control regime, enacted in 2021, is being coherently applied, resulting in timely clearances of over 20 mergers.
- The Authority has invested time in market studies, recently in fintech.

Portugal



Timely filing of M&A transactions is crucial to avoid costly fines, with a **record-breaking EUR2.5 million fine imposed in 2022 for gun jumping**.

- The PCA has focused on cases in the food and drinks retail distribution sector, resulting in fines amounting to **EUR675 million** in 2022.
- The healthcare sector has faced cartel investigations, leading to fines totalling EUR191 million in 2022.
- The PCA has opened cases in the labour market, targeting no-poach agreements, with fines reaching EUR11.3 million in 2022.
- Multinational companies are facing significant court battles as alleged victims of competition law infringements seek damages claims, potentially costing them hundreds of millions of euros.

Spain



Gun jumping has become a priority in the M&A field, with over 20 investigations opened on average each year. **Fines for gun jumping can be significant, reaching up to 5% of turnover**.

- The **authority has invested in technology** for smart detection of infringements, monitoring public tenders and prices. It is also focused on improving decision quality to avoid judicial overturning.
- Increased engagement with companies and citizens through public studies, consultations, and strategic planning initiatives, such as the recent guidance to calculate cartel damages or on prohibitions to participate in public tenders following antitrust infringements.
